THE PRESIDENT'S REPORT
1972-1973.

The past year got off to a late start as a result of the Civic Employees' Strike but picked up momentum rapidly. It turned out to be a very active year.

We were very fortunate in obtaining L.I.P. grants which allowed us to expand programme activities considerably - besides employing several additional people. This was a real benefit to the Community.

Our Director, Miss Dorothy Asuma, remained with us and she kept up the programme continuity in excellent fashion. Of particular significance was her "rescue" of a Summer Wilderness programme which started as a near disaster and through her efforts finished up as a very successful and worthwhile activity. Our previous Assistant Director, John LeGarff, resigned and we were pleased to welcome Mr. Rick Ciccone as his replacement.

We are particularly proud of our long overdue Trophy Case which now proudly displays the many trophies won by the Centre. To Mr. L. Poulsen our sincere thanks for his efforts in building it.

I only wish we could have been equally successful in our efforts to obtain better, more and enlarged office facilities. The ever increasing membership and activity list has put a real strain on the present facilities. I heartily commend this project to the incoming Board.

A significant first for the Centre was achieved in February, this when the Board of Park Commissioners held an open meeting at the Centre. It was a highlight enabling our members to meet the Commissioners, air their views and hear the comments of the Commissioners. We were very particularly pleased to meet Commissioner May Brown, without whose help in recent months we would not have been able to achieve the results we did. Our sincere thanks to her for her help and friendly personality.

We wish to give a word of encouragement to Mrs. Margaret Dupley and her I.C.E. Committee. Mrs. Dupley has taken up our cause for more ice for Kerrisdale residents and the work that she and her committee have done to date deserve a great deal of praise.

Our Arena suffered a severe blow early this year when the floor started to heave. After lengthy investigations and meetings with Parks Board members and City Hall staff, repairs are under way now. The whole incident has caused a severe loss to the Arena and, possibly of even more importance, has brought up conjecture as to its future operation. It is sincerely hoped that the new Board will continue our efforts to maintain for the Society the operation of the Arena and the continued employment of its valued staff.

There are so many people who deserve the thanks of the community for their help in keeping the Society in its active state. May I use Miss Dorothy Asuma, The Centre Director, and Mr. Harry Atkinson, the Arena Manager, to convey our sincere gratitude to them and their staffs for another successful year.

The year closed on a sorry note with the resignation of Mr. R. J. Dunn - the last remaining active member of the original founders of the Society. For some 24 years Bob has contributed more than his share to the Society - recent Boards have counted more and more on his experience and background knowledge. We are all sorry to see him retire but wish him well.

To all members of the Board, committee members and volunteer helpers may I add my personal thanks for making my efforts within the Society so gratifying.

KERRISDALE ARENA
ANNUAL REPORT OF OPERATIONS

During the past year of operation, the Arena has provided the Kerrisdale area residents with a wide variety of activities, from Public Skating to the Nights of Music, for example. We have continued the policy of underwriting the costs of programmes involving children, as much as possible, through revenue-producing spectator events. The usual free school skating parties were held again, carrying on the tradition set some years ago.

A small deficit was shown on the financial report. However, when it is considered that labour and other costs are increasing and that the value of free ice time donated to minor hockey was in the region of \$12,500.00 worth (priced at an average cost factor), the result is a very favourable reflection of the efforts of our Manager and his staff. As all costs increase every year, we will not be able to maintain the position, of course, without some increase in revenue and it may become necessary to charge a nominal amount in future years. We have, however, been given an indication from minor hockey sources that they would be pleased to discuss this with us.

It is very significant that the Kerrisdale Arena has operated for a quarter of a century without any operating subsidy from the taxpayers, unlike other arenas in the city.

The building is leased by the Society from the City of Vancouver, who are the owners, and it is now at the stage where repairs and renovations are necessary to the equipment and structure. Subsoil conditions below the building have also created a problem recently and the concrete floor beneath the ice requires replacement. The City of Vancouver, as the building owners, have been requested to provide the necessary funds and City Council have agreed to do so. Work has commenced on replacement of the floor and studies are under way to determine the necessity for replacement of lights, etc., which are now 25 years old. The Arena will be closed during the period of repairs, which means, unfortunately, that we will not be receiving any revenue during this time.

We were looking forward to a bright future, after this year, with new equipment and a more up-to-date floor construction, but the future is now somewhat obscure in view of the recent discussions by the Parks Board. We have requested that a meeting be held to clarify whether it is the intention of the Parks Board to take over control of the Arena, or not.

CENTRE DIRECTOR'S ANNUAL REPORT

MAY 1973

It is again my pleasure to present a brief summary of activities at Kerrisdale Community Centre during the 1972 - 73 programme year.

Statistical reviews are included in this booklet and give an interesting overview of the various activity categories and membership breakdowns into the various age groupings. Due to the unfortunate 7 week strike last May and June, the attendance figure for the year was down approximately 10,000. However it is interesting to note that membership at August 15th, 1972 totalled 5,917 and at April 30th, 1973 we already have 6,358 with 3½ months of membership sales yet to come in this programme year. Sports and Athletics continue to draw more participants than any other form of activity but the Arts and Crafts Section showed an increase of nearly 3,000 participants over the preceding year.

42 Special Events were either organized and conducted at the Centre or participated in by our members at other Recreation Centres. The Open House and Family Dinner was held again this year with greater success and attendance than in 1972. The Kerrisdale Community Centre Society underwrote all costs in connection with the dinner and therefore 250 of our members had a free evening meal. The staff arranged displays and demonstrations throughout the building which were well received by the many residents of Kerrisdale who paid us a visit.

The Kerrisdale Track Club was re-organized in October 1972 and now has approximately 35 members. Dr. Keith McDonald, the Club President and Richard Hanna, the coach, are to be congratulated on their first Track Meet organized and held recently at the Point Grey Secondary School Track.

We continued to receive financial aid through Local Initiatives Project from the time the civic strike ended (June 19) through to November 30th, 1972. A new application was forwarded in late November and we received a new grant of \$12,000 for use to the end of May 1973. We have been very fortunate in having 5 additional persons on staff through this project. New programmes were added, arts and crafts programmes extended, special events better organized and more adequately staffed. Minor building repairs were undertaken and 3 rooms painted. We presently await word on the possibility of a further extension. If no extension is forthcoming, it will be difficult to maintain the efficiency we have enjoyed over the past year.

On September 15th, we welcomed Mr. Rick Ciccone to our staff as Assistant Community Centre Director. Since Rick had worked for some time on our part-time staff, he was familiar with the facilities and many Kerrisdale members.

I would like to publicly acknowledge the many hours of service given to the Centre by our Volunteers. It would be extremely difficult for many of the adult clubs and children's activities to be held if it were not for these people.

Approximately 80 instructors and part-time staff conducted a total of 7,277 activity sessions during the year. That our activities offered were so well received is a great credit to this section of our staff.

The dedication which has been demonstrated by our permanent staff in every area of Centre operation and programme implementation has been very genuinely appreciated.

The President and Board of Directors of the Kerrisdale Community Centre Society are to be commended for their untiring efforts to assist us in the operation of the Centre. We much appreciate their support, without which many ideas and plans would not have been realized.

We look forward with enthusiasm to another year of growth in participation and further development of new and diversified activities for the residents of Kerrisdale.

ANNUAL REPORT - 1972/73

To the members:

I am pleased to present herewith my report covering the activities of the Kerrisdale Community Centre Soccer Association for the year ended April 30th, 1973.

Active Year

It has been another very active year for the Association with the 430 boys registered, ranging in age from 7 to 17, playing on 27 teams - 9 Pee Wee, 7 V & D and 11 Community.

Principle

The basic principle that continues to be followed is that every boy who desired to play soccer is given the opportunity to do so and is placed on a team after going through the try-outs.

FINANCIAL RESULTS

The financial results for the year showed an excess of receipts over payments of \$412.76. This excludes the cost of stenographic services and meeting facilities provided by the Centre. As you will see from the financial statement the accumulated surplus over the years has amounted to \$803.16 and indicates that the Association has not been a financial burden on the Centre.

EXECUTIVE

Your executive, consisting of fifteen members, have worked very hard on your behalf. They have met regularly throughout the season dealing with various matters within the Association and relationships with other soccer groups.

LADIES AUXILIARY

We are greatly indebted to the Ladies Auxiliary who have provided tremendous support to the Association and worked very hard on registration day, the social events, the publication of the newsletters and in many other ways.

REFEREES

We are most fortunate in having in the Association, our own referees' group which is second to none in the City. They have the responsibility of officiating at home Pee Wee and Community games.

SOCIAL EVENTS

Several social events were held during the year and these helped the members to become better acquainted with one another.

PARENT & SON BANQUET

This was held on October 21st and 288 attended. Mr. J. Johnson was the guest speaker and there was a film and raffle prizes. At that time also, the Kerrisdale trophies for the 1971-1972 season were presented to the V & D 2th Division Chargers and the Community 5th Division Spartans.

WINE & CHEESE PARTY

This was held on March 2nd for the purpose of showing our appreciation of the great efforts expended by the coaches, managers and others in operating our teams. 88 were in attendance.

TROPHIES PRESENTATION

On April 14th the Kerrisdale trophies for the 1972-1973 season were presented to the V & D 7th Division Thunderbirds and the Community 7th Division Eagles, (who also won their league and tied for the Dave Moyies trophy). The Kerrisdale trophies were very generously donated by Mr. C. J. Coveney for the Kerrisdale V & D and Community teams with the highest points per game average. Awards were also presented to the V & D Division I boys who had progressed through the different Kerrisdale divisions during their juvenile soccer careers. In addition, sportsmen awards were presented by our Referees. About 150 people were in attendance.

SEATTLE SOCCER EXCHANGE

This annual event was held in the Fall instead of the Spring and despite the weather was very successful.

PEE WEE GALA DAY

A gala day for the Pee Wees was held April 28th for the first time. There were soccer games, tug of war contests and competitions involving different soccer skills.

COACHING CLINIC

A successful coaching clinic was held in the Fall. We strenuously urge all coaches and managers to attend future clinics.

PUBLICITY

This was rather difficult to maintain on a continuing basis, but numerous items of interest pertaining to the Association were published in the Kerrisdale Courier. The newsletters issued by the Ladies Auxiliary were also very interesting. Bumper stickers were also distributed and a banner made by Mrs. Dieter Freundt certainly made people aware of Kerrisdale's presence.

FUTURE

The following were matters which should be considered in the future:

1. Upgrading of coaching ability.
2. Gala days for all boys.
3. Formation of girls' teams.
4. Entry of team in Inter-City league.

I would like to thank very much indeed the members of the Executive and the Association who worked so hard during the past season, for their tremendous efforts and support.

SWIM PROGRAMME REPORT 1972

Registration and Programme

The total number of students registered was 359; 90 of which took part in two sets of lessons, and 24 in three sets. There were some cancelations. Several students attended more than one type of lesson in a set. In some cases, students were registered late and were charged only part fees; others, to allow for previously arranged camps and holidays, or sickness, overlapped the lesson sets to complete a 3 week course. This was done whenever class space permitted, in order to accommodate as many people as possible. These children were not always present or ready to be tested during examinations.

64 members were registered in the competitive club. 3 of these had to be asked to leave as they were registered in winter clubs, and this is against the rules of the B.C. Summer Swim Association. They received refunds. Several who registered very late paid only partial fees.

The later registration days, and lack of early advance notice due to the civic strike cut into the first set of lessons, as a number of people registered in other programmes. A registration day following each set of lessons was helpful once it became known. 4 full registration days and 2 afternoons were held.

Pool time was increased this year by half an hour per day; 8:30 a.m. - 1:00 p.m. including Fridays. As swim lessons are only four days a week, Friday mornings were used by the club, as well as the hour per day from 5:00 - 6:00 p.m. Two hours on Friday mornings were used for time trials and special practices for the different age groups. The club really needs more pool time if the standard is to be improved. However, it would mean more instructor time. Hopefully a larger registration next year would make this possible.

The swim lessons added 2 new types of classes this year. Introduction to Competitive swimming and the Royal Life Saving Society Bronze Cross. The first will not be necessary next year when the club starts training in the beginning of June. There seems to be a need for the Bronze Cross now that we have trained so many Bronze Medallion students. This years class was small, but with advance notice next year it should be worth trying in one lesson set. It was included this year because we had so many requests during the registration.

The club took part in 8 meets, hosting 2. At the final meet of the season, the Inter-pool Parks Board Championship Meet, Kerrisdale won the 2nd place pennant. At a wind-up party, we held "The Kerrisdale Summer Olympics". Two teams competed in novelty races, which were followed by refreshments. 14 members were chosen to form part of a Vancouver Parks Board team, competing in the B.C. Summer Swim Association Regional meets.

Advertising

Information was mailed to all last year's students during the 3rd week of June. At the same time the Kerrisdale Courier ran a paid advertisement, listing both lessons and club information prior to the four registration days. They also ran a news story at the beginning of each set of lessons. Several photographs appeared in the issue before the last registration day. Posters were used to announce the beginning of each set of lessons.

Equipment

The equipment is in good repair and adequate. None should be needed for next year. The equipment hut was satisfactorily repaired, making a very strong roof. My husband made 4 new supports for the balance bars. The 6 additional life jackets were not purchased. As the price had gone up on them, it was decided to manage with what we had. The swim

wings for the Mom and Tot classes were very successful.

Mr. R. J. Lawlor made Lane Number Markers for the swim club, which contributed to the smooth running of the home meets. May I suggest a letter of thanks be sent from the Board.

Staff

The staff was very satisfactory this year. Besides the office assistant, there were 5 instructors and an assistant to the synchronized swimming classes. The Assistant, Maureen Skuce, is a girl who had been trained through our programme in Red Cross and Royal Lifesaving classes, and who has had several years training in a competitive synchronized club. She was a great help to Mrs. Imredy. Three substitutes were needed to temporarily replace 2 instructors who were ill, and one who had a previous commitment for the last week of the programme.

The club has a coach and one assistant. Parental participation was most appreciated during home meets and to provide transportation to other pools for meets. 24 deck officials are required to run a meet properly, and the parents showed great interest in learning how to fill the necessary positions.

Finance

Expenses have been heavy this year. We have repaired and added to equipment, and purchased the Kerrisdale Award crests. This was so that children who passed the Kerrisdale swim level tests would receive crests just as those who passed Red Cross levels. They have been well worth the expense in Public Relations alone - the children are thrilled and parents approving. While \$200.00 seems a large expenditure, we have enough on hand for the next 3 years barring an extraordinary registration. Instructors salaries were slightly higher this year, as we had only one inexperienced one with a lower salary scale. Mrs. James who was hired as the diving instructor was excellent, as the increased registration in that category proves. Jesslen Spencer, who specializes in life-saving and was the club coach has proved extremely capable. Good instructors are the backbone of a programme and competitive pay scale with other pools must be offered to acquire and hold them.

The club will have lost money. Frankly it cannot support an actively participating Director. Anywhere over 30 children in the water requires two coaches. In an effort to reduce costs, I worked the Friday mornings to save the salary of the assistant. Also the assistant did not get paid for meets, other than the home meets, when all the help possible is needed. She should be paid for all meets but as it was in the Directors contract to attend all inter-club meets, she was not needed as well. However, out of interest in the swimmers and for the sake of continuity, she attended voluntarily.

With a capable coach and assistant, the Director should only be needed for registrations, organization and supervision of the home meets, to maintain records and to act as trouble-shooter when the coach cannot handle a child or a complaint. She should not need to attend pool sessions or meets at other pools. This would cut down on the Director's time and consequently salary. While I seem to be talking myself or some future Director out of money, I am also trying to eliminate wasted time and put the programme on a sound basis. The key work is the coach, who must be knowledgeable and capable of maintaining discipline. Jesslen Spencer fulfils both requirements admirably. She indicates she would work with us next year.

Parents complained at the increase of fees, particularly where there were 3 or 4 children in the family, and as the other clubs in the league had not increased theirs. I would like to recommend a family rate: \$10.00 for the first child, \$7.00 for the second and \$5.00 for each additional child per family. While this seems to be defeating our need for a larger income, it should increase registration.

A further recommendation is that the swim programme be handled as one account. It is futile to try to separate the charges properly when all registrations are done together and most club inquiries, arrangements and registrations are attended to during the swim lessons when the Director is always available. Also as the coaches are instructors also, of necessity, it would simplify pay sheets to use only one account.

I would like to thank the Centre secretaries, especially Mrs. Shelagh MacDonald, for their unfailing help and co-operation again this summer.
